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Message from Mrs Helen Glass, Headteacher

This week, we have been involved in the launch of the Department for Education's new Mandarin Excellence Programme. The MEP is a new intensive language programme, funded by the Department for Education, which will see at least 5,000 school pupils in England on track to fluency in Mandarin Chinese by 2020. Participating schools, of which we are one of the first – with support from UCL Institute of Education and the British Council – are at the forefront of delivering the programme. By working towards achieving a very high level of Mandarin Chinese, students on the programme are being given an unprecedented opportunity in terms of language provision in schools in England. In being the most widely spoken language in the world, Mandarin Chinese is one of the most important languages for the UK's future – young people on the programme will be getting a head start in life by mastering this vital skill at an early stage, and I am delighted that we can offer our students the chance to take part.

Also this week, staff and students spent some time collectively thinking about visual literacy, ie the way we interpret meaning from images. Led by Mr Holden in the Art Department, we are working on a school-wide theme of the recent Paralympics. Individual class groups are also going to improve the displays in their classrooms. By taking a more consistent approach to our displays, we aim to reflect the quality of the wide range of activities taking place in school.

Finally, huge congratulations to the VEX Robotics teams who performed so brilliantly this week and are through to the National Final of this prestigious competition! Thanks to our wonderful FSA for helping to fund this amazing opportunity. You can read more about it below.

In the World Chess Championship in New York, the score is 2.5-2.5 after 5 draws in the match of 12 games. World Champion Carlsen has been most surprised by the resilience (and stamina) of the challenger, Karjakin. Games 3 and 4 lasted 7+ hours. After Game 5, Carlsen looked tired and agitated – could the underdog win?

Note: There are no longer chess adjournments after move 40 (as occurred in the 5 famous matches of Karpov vs Kasparov from 1984 to 1990) due to the computer era. Each game nowadays must be concluded on the day and helps to explain why only 12 games are played, compared with the usual 24 games played previously (or the record 48 games played in 1984/85).

Fortismere Robotics - Mr Yakup, Head of Enterprise Faculty

Three Fortismere Robotics teams were entered on Wednesday 16th November 2016 at the East Barnet Vex Regionals. Two teams entered for VEX IQ (Key Stage 3) and one team entered for the first time in VEX EDR (Key Stages 4 and 5).

It was a very long day and it was well worth it – two Fortismere teams out of the three gained places to the UK National final. What was really impressive was the VEX EDR team's game play and strategy - it was outstanding – remodifying the robot and reprogramming on the fly to play to our strength in an alliance with an East Barnet



team to beat last year's National Champions (The John Warner School) was a wonderful achievement! As it was our first time, we were out resourced by all the other teams and inexperienced, but our EDR team showed true resilience in the face of adversity and were exceptional.

The atmosphere between the schools, East Barnet, The John Warner School, Henrietta Barnet, and Grieg City, in sharing each other's experiences and knowledge between them, made the day very welcoming, friendly, productive and collegial.

From the Library

Fortismere's Patron of Reading, SF Said spent the afternoon of Tuesday 15th November with some of our Year 8 students. He met them all last year as Year 7s, when they concentrated on reading (culminating in the wonderful Reading Champions evening in June). This year he is working on their creative writing skills. Each class had a short time to write, non-stop, something they would like to read. SF talked about his own efforts to re-draft (and re-draft, and re-draft...) which the students then did. Year 8s produced some imaginative "flash fiction", some of which SF will be publishing on his blog (watch this space for the link). It wouldn't be an SF visit if he didn't mention the importance of reading! As he says, a writer is just a reader who has taken the next step to creativity!



Baileys Prize nominated author Jemma Wayne told me that her adult sessions usually only last 20 minutes, so when she talked on Wednesday 16th November to 70 Year 12 students for nearly two hours she said she was amazed and impressed by the way they listened so intently. After studying Social and Political Sciences at Cambridge, Jemma became a journalist and she gave the students lots of hints and tips about university life and the world of work. In her latest novel, *Chains of Sand*, she explores the suffering on both sides of the Israeli/Palestinian conflict, feminism, anti-Semitic feelings in England and issues of personal and national identity. These are huge issues which she discussed with her audience as well as reading

some thought-provoking and occasionally harrowing scenes from the book. An interesting, moving and enriching visit for our 6th formers.

Don't forget that next meeting of CoverUp (our parent/staff reading group) is next Thursday 24th November, 7pm in the library. We're discussing *Chains of Sand* by Jemma Wayne! It was great to welcome several members of the group to meet Jemma so we are expecting some added insight... If you haven't read it or haven't finished it, come anyway as we always end up having a general bookish chat (and we do still have some copies of the book for sale at a reduced price if you are inspired to read it after the discussion). New members always very welcome.

Film of the Week in our film corner next week is The Producers.


Recommended Reads of the Week


A teaser of some of the stalls who will be there on the day – each image represents a different stall:
