

Fortismere Sixth Form and student learning agreement

This agreement needs to be signed and returned to your form tutor. You will not be fully enrolled until you have returned it.

I understand that:

Fortismere Sixth Form Attendance Policy

We know that poor attendance and punctuality affects not only individual student's grades but also the learning of the whole class; content missed may have to be repeated; group activities and presentations are disrupted. It also shows a lack of respect for, and a poor attitude towards, the teachers and the subjects being missed.

Monitoring of attendance

All Fortismere Sixth Form students will be closely monitored by the school to ensure attendance does not become a hurdle to their academic success. Parents/ carers will receive a daily email to let them know if the student has missed lessons, or if they have been marked late to lessons. If students are becoming a cause for concern due to attendance the following will happen:

Stage 1

Letter will be sent home and tutors will meet with the student

Stage 2

If no improvement is seen the student will meet with their Learning Manager and may be placed on an attendance report. They will also be required to attend the Private Study room in their non-contact periods. This will be monitored by our Academic Coach who is based in this room. If we see an improvement in attendance then the students will be allowed to stop attending private study in their non-contact periods.

Stage 3

Students who have still not improved after the previous two stages will attend an attendance panel with their parents/carers. If attendance has consistently been below 95% the student may be required to stay on an attendance report and report to the Director of Sixth Form daily. Where it has been consistently below 90% students may be asked to leave the school. At this stage we will ensure the student has a careers appointment and is given advice about how to either access the workplace or look at other courses available at other educational establishments.

- Emails at the end of the day if late or absent
- Adjust registers if notified



HOW DO WE MONITOR ATTENDANCE?

Through daily registers in lessons and private study

ATTENDANCE – LEARNING AGREEMENT

• if my attendance falls below 95% I may be required to attend full time private study.

 if my attendance falls below 90% I may be asked to leave

HOW DO WE RESPOND TO POOR ATTENDANCE?

Stage 1

tutors will discuss with the student

Stage 2

- meet with their Learning Manager and may be placed on an attendance report.
- attend the Private Study room in their non-contact periods (monitored by our Academic Coach)

HOW DO WE RESPOND TO POOR ATTENDANCE?

Stage 3

- Meeting with parents/carers and student
- Report daily
- If no improvement may be asked to leave

ORGANISATION

- Regular folder checks
- We will be checking to see the care taken over the organisation, collation and presentation of work
- On-going work folder for every subject to be brought to every lesson

ORGANISATION

Equipment will vary from subject to subject but students will generally need:

- A ring binder file for every subject
- Plastic Wallets

- Pens (write in black but red and green pens should also be brought)



Financial Support for Sixth Form Students

At Fortismere we will offer 3 different Bursary Funds - a Support Bursary, a Maintenance Bursary and a Discretionary Bursary.

Support Bursary

Students who meet the following criteria will be eligible for a Support Bursary of £1200 per year

- Students who are living in care aged 16 or 17
- •Students who are care leavers aged 16, 17 or 18 (i.e. any student who has spent time in care previously)
- •Students aged 16, 17 or 18 and in receipt of Income Support
- •Students with a disability and in receipt of Employment Support Allowance and Disability Living Allowance.

The Bursary will be paid in 3 instalments of £400 each term.

Eligible students will need to maintain above 90% attendance to receive payments and must agree to this before receiving their first payment

Financial Support for 6th Form Students

Maintenance Bursary

Students of low income households are eligible to apply for a Maintenance Bursary to support their continued full time education. The amount of the Maintenance Bursary will depend upon the number of applications received. Maintenance Bursaries are likely to be similar to the previous EMA system and will be assessed according to Free School Meals criteria. Maintenance Bursaries will be available to students if their parent / carer is in receipt of **one** of the following:

- Income Support
- Income Based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income Related Employment and Support Allowances
- Child Tax Credit(providing they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and their annual income as assessed by Revenues & Customs is below £16,190
- Support from NASS and supported under Part IV of the Immigration Act 1999

Eligible students will need to maintain above 90% attendance to receive payments and must agree to this before receiving their first payment

fortismere Financial Support for 6th Form Students

Discretionary Bursary

Priority will be given to Support Bursaries and Maintenance Bursaries however once these have been allocated applications for Discretionary Bursaries will be considered. Discretionary Bursaries consist of one-off payments to students facing financial barriers to their participation and learning. Students will need to provide evidence of educational need and household income. They can be applied for at any time during the academic year although oversubscription may apply.

Eligible students will need to demonstrate above 90% attendance to receive payments.
