What is Key Stage 4?

- Key Stage 4 is the time at school where students study for and take their Level 2 examinations.
 - These include GCSE's and BTEC's.
- Key Stage 4 is a critical time of a young person's life where they start to take important steps towards the career of their choice.
- Students have a greater responsibility to work hard and perform in their subjects.

What has changed with GCSE's in recent years?


- GCSE have become more challenging
- New Assessment System
- Less Controlled Assessments / More emphasis on Summer Examinations
- Greater Expectations in terms of quality of skills / literacy

GCSE's are becoming more challenging!


- Specification content has become more challenging and also there is more of it
- Old Level 3 content is now in Level 2 Courses
- The assessments are more rigorous
- Greater Percentage of Final Grade placed on examinations
- Highest ever percentage awarded for SPaG
- Texts in English are now 'unseen'

New Assessment System

- Exams in the United Kingdom will be graded from 9 to 1, instead of A*to G, where a 9 is the top grade assigned, achieved by the top 3% of all students in the nation.
- Statistics will be used to ensure there is alignment between the new and current grading structures, such that:
- Broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 4 and above as currently achieve a grade C and above
- Broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 7 and above as currently achieve a grade A and above
- Broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 1 and above as currently achieve a grade G and above

Less Controlled Assessments

- Previously there have been a number of Controlled Assessments or Coursework elements which allow students the opportunity to work outside of the exam hall.
- There is now a larger emphasis on the final examinations in Year 11.
- This means that students are required to recall their knowledge in the summer examinations of Year 11.

More emphasis on Summer Examinations

- 1. All GCSE external exams are now taken at the end of the course.
- Students can no longer re-sit individual modules, although they can re-sit the full GCSE
- GCSE exams will take place in May/June.
- Controlled assessments are internal assessments and usually a minor part of the GCSE
- Marks are awarded for accurate spelling, punctuation and use of grammar in external GCSE exams

BTEC and other vocational courses.

BTEC courses are very much based on coursework and the need for independent study.

- Students complete Core and Optional modules
- Evidence for assessment may be in a number of formats; video recordings, diary entries, audio recordings, PowerPoint presentations
- All modules are marked by the course leader and verified in school. Students are given an opportunity to increase their grade within a 15 day extension. Samples are assessed by an external verifier.

A brief introduction...

fortismere Progress 8

- P8 measures a student's progress across 8 subjects between Key Stage 2 and Key Stage 4 across eight key subjects.
- It shows whether students have performed to expectation, based on a value-added measure using Key Stage 2 English and Maths as a baseline.

Attainment 8


- A8 measures a student's average grade across eight subjects – the same subjects that count towards <u>Progress</u>
 8.
- Calculating Attainment 8
- A student's Attainment 8 score is calculated by adding up their points for their eight subjects and dividing by 10 to get their Attainment 8 score. Students don't have to take eight subjects, but they score zero for any unfilled slots.

How these measures impact curriculum design in schools

Compulsory Subjects at Key Stage 4?

 The 'Core Subjects' are the subjects that all students across the country study in Key Stage 4. The core subjects are:

- English Literature
- English Language
- Mathematics
- Triple or Double Science
- This pathway is decided through end of Yr9 test




Mandarin Excellence Programme

How to make decisions on which course to take?


- What subjects do you enjoy?

- Grade 7s+ in maths and sciences to study A Level maths, biology, chemistry and physics.


Requirements for progression into higher education

- Study a minimum of 3 A levels or a BTEC level 3
- The most competitive universities require GCSE grade 6s in English Language and 6 in maths

A handy diagram showing your options at 16 and 18.





Another route to getting a Degree is through an Apprenticeship

- An apprenticeships is a "a genuine job, with training", which means your are "earning while you learning" and gaining the necessary skills, professional competencies and qualifications needed for that industry and job role,
- You can start an apprenticeship from age 16 ½, there's not upper age limit, but most people start at between age 18 and 21 years old
- Apprenticeships have a built-in progression route; a formal system to work your way up through the different levels, form Level 2 to 7, building your skills, experience, qualifications and earning power
- Apprentices start at Level 2-3, where training will take place at a college or training Centre on a day release basis (1:4)
- On <u>higher and degree apprenticeship</u>, Level 4 7, apprentices will be study and work at the same time - attending university on a part time basis (1:4 or block release)


