Important Message from our Safer Schools Police Officer

In the last few weeks there has been a spate of robberies around the Muswell Hill, Crouch End and Highgate area. We are asking parents to talk to their sons and daughters about being extra vigilant about their movements, particularly after school. Please be assured that there is an increased police presence in these areas at present. However, the points below are useful tips for Fortismere Students.

Staying safe from robbery:

- If you have to walk alone at early evening take extra care. Stay on roads that are well lit and relatively busy
- Plan your route in advance (walking or taking public transport)

- Avoid short cuts that involve alleyways or walking across parks or commons unless they are well-lit
- Be aware of your surroundings and stay alert to what's going on around you
- Be careful with your electronics; talking on a mobile phone, listening to an MP3 player shows thieves that you have something to steal
- If you think you are being followed, cross the road or go into a shop and stay there until you're sure you're safe.

They have been developing their field work skills by investigating the possible extend of ice cover in Pembrokshire by looking at glacial deposits and landforms on the beaches of Abermawr and Manorbier. They have also been investigating the varying perceptions of place in Milford Haven and Tenby.

History Trip to Berlin

The week before half term saw the History Department taking 55 Year 10 and 11 students to Berlin, a city that features heavily in our GCSE course. It was a fantastic chance for the students to deepen their understanding of Germany, the context of Europe in the 1920 and 1930s, the build-up to World War Two, and to learn about the city's turbulent history during the Cold War years.

The students benefitted from a series of excellent guides leading them around locations such as the Reichstag building, the Berlin Wall Memorial, the German Historical Museum, the Wansee Conference Centre, and Sachsenhausen concentration camp. Students also visited the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe and the Topography of Terror museum, which gave them the opportunity to reflect on how the terrible crimes of Nazi Germany are represented and remembered today.

An additional highlight on the trip was a visit to Berlin's Thursday night market in the Mitte area of the city. This



All of the teachers accompanying the trip felt that it was a resounding success, in large part due to the excellent behaviour and engagement by the students throughout the four days. As a group and as individuals, the students on the trip were a real credit to themselves and to the school. We hope that every student enjoyed the trip as much as we did.

World Premiere Concert for Fortismere Music Centre

ortismere Community Symphony Orchestra will perform their next concert on 17 March at St. ◀ Andrew's Church in Muswell Hill (poster attached). The concert will feature the world premiere of 'Cinematic Overture' by Rohan Stevenson (a parent at Fortismere), conducted by Thomas Gregory. This is the first new commission by Fortismere Music Centre in its 9 year history, and marks the first of 3 new commissions by local composers over the next year. The piece will accompany Sibelius's 'Violin Concerto' and Vaughan-Williams' 'London' Symphony.

ortismere Music Centre Manager, Joseph Winters, said: "This is a very exciting time for Fortismere" ◀ Music Centre. As we approach our ten-year anniversary it is thrilling to see the scale and reach of the Centre grow at every level. Premiering original compositions gives the Symphony Orchestra a unique sense of purpose and adds a whole new level to our commitment to support local musicians. Our concerts are always bound together by a "Community music-making belief that community musicmaking should be bold and am- should he hold and amhitious." bitious, tackling an expansive programme with a flair for the theatrical and a sense of fun.

This concert, in which a brand new piece will shine alongside two popular classics, will be entertaining and engaging for audiences and performers alike. Above all else, this music invites everyone to join in: they are an exciting and accessible entry point to the world of classical music, as wonderful for the novice as the expert. At Fortismere Music Centre we believe that it is in such an experience of joining in, either as an instrumental student or singer, as an orchestral player or an audience member, that the truest sense of our community flourishes."

omposer, Rohan Stevenson, said: "This piece is unapologetically written in a cinematic orchestral language, familiar in the work of John Williams [composer of Star Wars, Indiana Jones, Harry Pot-✓ ter]. It uses a broad tonal palette, flourishes, and sweeping gestures. It was originally titled 'Goonies' after the 1985 film which I saw when I was growing up, not because of the score, but because it has something of the character of the film as I remembered it: a slightly breathless and innocent sense of adventure! This is the sort of fun music a serious composer might write when he thinks nobody is watching... or listening."
