

When I became the Head of College of Olympia in September 2017, I wanted to offer our year 7 students a chance to get to know each other at the start of their time at secondary school and so last year, I came up with the idea to take them on a day trip and overnight camp. No-one stopped me so I went ahead and made it happen! This is now the second year that this event has happened. As you can imagine, it is an immense amount of planning and organisation to make this vision a reality. An activity such as this can only really take place in late September / early October as this is the start of the academic year and the weather is just about warm! This mammoth task would have been so much harder had I not had the help and expertise of Mr Yakup (who set up the on-line permission slips), the finance team who sorted out everything financial, or the admin and communications team who have sent out parent mails, newsletter entries and put information on the school website. Finally, we must not forget that these trips could not even go ahead without the teachers who voluntarily give up their Friday night and Saturday morning to supervise the hundreds of children. This year, I have to say a massive thanks to the FSA who subsidised the entire cost of the coaches and to the Tottenham Grammar School Fund who matched the same amount of money based on my application to them. This generous financial support meant that the cost of the trip was reduced compared to last year and it meant that we could financially aid more families. In its second year, we recruited more year 7's to the trip and I also have a wealth of feedback from the questionnaires that I have sent out to the parents and posted on google classroom for the students. The feedback is overwhelmingly positive and the obvious biggest complaint was the weather (thank goodness for those weather apps which prepared people for a chilly night). I would like to share the very positive feedback from these questionnaires; I would like to thank everyone for their constructive feedback as this is helpful in planning for next year. I would finally like to say how pleased I am that this is such an enjoyable and valuable experience for the large number of children and families who decide to become part of the Fortismere community.

Our group did to many climbing activities that I had done many times before and also I really wanted to do aero ball and the bungee run but we didn't


I did every one even though I didn't want to do the caving because I get claustrophobic. In the end I did do it and I'm glad that I did.

I was fun being up with my friends but is was really cold and I was a bit homesick before I went to bed.


I really enjoyed the food and the massive bonfire, but the night was freeeeezing cold.luckily the bonfire was on all night.

I liked everything besides (no offence) the teachers keeping us up all night with your "singing"



It was my first camping trip and I had really good fun I loved making friends and I just loved the whole experience


the most fun part for me was when we were sent to bed and everyone was eating everything and going crazy.
