Headteacher Recruitment - Student Voice

ast Thursday we held the student interviews for a new headteacher. We had Student Ambassadors from Years 7-10 as well as Student Leaders from Years 11 and 13. It was really great that the school included the student voice with such an important decision. All the students participating in the interviews had prepared some questions, including:

- What subjects will you be making a focus on in this school?

- Would you expand the sixth form provision?

- What would you do to make students more drug aware?

- How would you motivate an unmotivated teacher?

- What makes you think you would make a great head teacher for our school?

- How would you keep and improve on our outstanding standards in GCSE's and A levels?

- How much contact with and how visible to the student body will you be?

- In what way do you see yourself as appealing to the students?

Il the candidates responded very professionally but we as students unanimously decided which ones we would choose as our headteacher.

The interviewing process took the form of speed dating where each pair of students would spend five minutes with each candi-

date. After the interviewing process we reported back to the governors. I feel that they really took our points into



consideration and clearly used our feedback when making their decision. To be involved in this has not only been really great for the students because we know that our voice is being heard, but hopefully very useful for the governors as well.

The Representation of the People Act: 6th February 1918



e could not let this week pass without drawing attention to this significant event in women's history. Although the Act fell short of granting women full political equality with men, it was a very important milestone. Women over 30 who met minimum property qualifications or who were university graduates gained the vote and the Act was matched by the Parliament (Qualification of Women) Act 1918 which allowed women to stand for election.

rguments still rage over whether it was the militant behaviour of the Suffragettes (suspended during World War One) or the polite, but persistent, campaigning of the Suffragists which finally persuaded Parliament to pass the Act, with the Commons voting 385-55 in favour of the bill. Certainly, the vital contribution that women made to the war effort undermined the arguments against women having the vote, although MPS felt that younger women were too flighty to vote under the age of 30.

t must also be remembered that the Act enfranchised working class men, adding to its impact on the development of democracy in Great Britain and Ireland. After the Act, the 7.7 million who had been entitled to vote in 1912 had risen to 21.4 million by the end of 1918. 43% were women.

The first female MP, elected in the first election held after the passing of the Act (December 1918) was Countess Markievicz, who as a representative for Sinn Fein declined to take up her seat in Parliament. Instead, she sat in the Dáil Éireann, the first Irish Parliament, established without the permission of the British Government and not legally recognised. Nancy Astor was the first woman to actually sit in the House of Commons as an MP and within 10 years, the

Sylvia Pankhurst, who never stopped campaigning for the rights of women, consistently made the link between having the vote and using it to improve women's lives. As we look back, we can see the many positive changes that have happened for women in the century following the Act. We can also see that Sylvia Pankhurst's work is yet to be completed.

Portismere will continue to engage with the arguments and will be hosting its second International Women's Day event on March 7th. And in this spirit we will leave the last words to Hilary Clinton: "I believe the rights of women and girls is the unfinished business of the 21st Century."
