






History Department

The 24 foot long illustration reflects on different parts of preparation and battle, highlighting its chaos and magnitude. Student versions were displayed underneath the original and showed incredible creativity- well done to all involved!









year 9 trip to the Imperial War Museum

To support their study of World War One and in recognition of their consistent hard work in lessons, fifty year 9 students were taken to the Imperial War Museum. They explored the exhibitions on World War One, the armistice, World War Two and modern conflict. The students were a credit to the school as they explored the museum, asking interesting and relevant questions and taking time to consider the experience of the individual at different times of total war.

Year 12 Trip to the British Sociological Association

On Tuesday Ms Akinbode and I took a group of Year 12 sociologists to visit the annual British Sociological Association talk on feminism. Panellists included, Karen Ingala-Smith from the Counting Dead Women project, Cofounder of Femicide Census (with Women's Aid) and CEO of NIA, Stevi Jackson from the University of York, Aisha Phoenix from SOAS University of London and Aaron Winter from the University of East London. Topics covered included feminism and Islam, transgender rights, femicide, sexuality, racism and misogyny. The students thoroughly enjoyed branching into aspects of feminism that are not covered in the A-level specification, exploring contemporary research and ideas. They contributed to the discussion with these renowned academics with maturity and self-assurance and represented Fortismere excellently!



News from the Library

On Tuesday 11th December our lovely Patron of Reading, Non Pratt, returned for a day of entertainment, inspiration and jollity with some of our students. Year 8 students were treated to a session based around Non's book, *Truth or Dare.* As well as explaining the importance of honesty, identity and bravery, Non encouraged volunteers in the audience to take part in some truth/dare challenges which led to much hilarity, mild shock and total revulsion! Non then had lunch with the members of Ms Massey's creative writing groups, talked to them about writing and publishing and took away some of their work which she will read and offer advice on (in a previous life, she was a publishing editor at Usborne Books). In the afternoon, Non met with a small group of Year 13 English language/literature students, and gave a writing masterclass based on her adaptation of John Allison's *Giant Days* graphic novels. A wonderful day during which many Jaffa cakes were devoured and much fun was had.









We have had the first meeting of the Alexandra Palace Children's Book Award group (formerly the Haringey CBA). Thirty excited Year 7s have signed up, and most took away a book from the shortlist to read over the Christmas holiday. Our next meeting will be on Friday 11th January at lunchtime in the library.
