## Supporting Attendance at Fortismere

Geminee Patel: Attendance Improvement Lead - it's a pleasure to connect with you all. My role at Fortismere is dedicated to fostering a culture of regular and consistent attendance and creating an environment where every student feels inspired to be in school and engaged in their learning journey. My previous experiences of working with young people have equipped me with insights and a deep commitment to making a positive impact on the lives of our students. I'm excited about my role and the opportunity to contribute to the improvement of attendance across the school. To make



this work, the school, students and families need to work together to build a community where attendance isn't just a routine but a reflection of our shared dedication to education. Please see below for a reminder of school attendance procedures ready for the start of next term.

#### Prompt Reporting of Illnesses and Emergencies:

- Illnesses and emergencies must be reported via email to <u>attendance@fortismere.org.uk</u> or by telephone on 0208 365 4429 before 8:30 am on the day of absence.
- If leaving a voicemail, please state the student's full name and year/registration group.

#### Timely Notification of Appointments:

- Parents are required to email any medical or other appointments to <u>attendance@fortismere.org.uk</u>, copying in the Form Tutor, a minimum of 24 hours in advance to avoid daily detention for the student in case of tardiness.
- Failure to comply with this timeframe may result in a detention if the student arrives late.

#### **Doctor and Dental Appointments:**

- Routine doctor and dental appointments, with the exception of emergencies, should be scheduled outside of school hours.
- In the case of emergency appointments, please provide evidence such as appointment letters to attendance@fortismere.uk

#### Leave of Absence Requests:

- Planned absences, including holidays, medical appointments (hospital/orthodontist), music exams, language exams, ballet exams, local funerals, and religious festivals, require submission of a Leave of Absence Form via <u>https://form.jotformeu.com/fortismere/loa201920</u>
- Approval for all requests must be sought from the Co-Headteachers.

## **LINC News**

#### **Meet The Team**

This week I'm pleased to introduce you to one of our Teaching Assistants - Junior Matti.

Why did you want to work in the LINC department? Throughout my time at school, I always found it hard to stay focused and complete work and would avoid tasks that involved reading or writing, because of this I was regularly labelled as 'troublesome' by many of my teachers. A few took the time to properly understand me and because of those teachers I



was able to eventually succeed and do well. It wasn't until I got to university that I was diagnosed with dyslexia and potentially ADHD; this made everything a lot clearer and explained why I had experienced such a troubled time at school. As I got older, I realised that I wanted to work in education and to be the staff member that I had needed when I was struggling at school.

What's the best thing about your job? There are many things: being part of a student's development and helping them to discover their superpower so they can achieve and succeed; the fact that no two days at work are the same; and working with my brilliant co-workers in LINC.

What superpower would you like to share with the school community this week? I'm talking about autism spectrum disorder (ASD) - ASD presents differently in boys than in girls and this creates unique challenges and opportunities for understanding and supporting those with the disorder. Boys are more frequently diagnosed with autism leading to a gender disparity. Girls with autism often exhibit subtler

symptoms, such as social withdrawal and intense interests, which may be misinterpreted. Consequently, girls may receive diagnoses later in life or be misdiagnosed with other conditions. Understanding gender-specific manifestations is crucial for early identification and for tailored interventions.

I think it is interesting to see the amount of people with autism in the world of sport; the focus and discipline required in many sports can serve as a channel for individuals with ASD to showcase their talents. Sports personalities, like football player Greg Halford and professional basketball player Jason McElwain, have shattered stereotypes and demonstrated the incredible potential within the autism community. Engagement in sport not only provides physical



benefits but also develops social skills, teamwork, and self-esteem. Recognising and celebrating these achievements contributes to a more inclusive perspective on autism, challenging stereotypes and preconceptions about the limitations individuals face and inspiring others with ASD to pursue their passions.

**Some top festive tips from the Haringey Autism Youth Club Members** include - Plan a marathon of christmas movies this is essential for any successful holiday season! Have some indoor and outdoor activities planned for the festive period. Make a christmas playlist on Spotify in case of emergencies. Don't expect your autistic child to take part in christmas rituals, they will join in if they want to.


