Weekly Roundup

It's been a full week of activities here at Fortismere. There were two parental engagement events: The Year 7 Welcome Evening for parents and our SEND information Evening for parents which took place on Wednesday and Thursday evenings consecutively. Both evenings were well attended. It is always a delight to welcome Year 7 parents en masse to Fortismere in the Autumn term as it presents an opportunity for us to introduce key members of staff and importantly to engage our community in the opportunities that take place outside the classroom. We have already stated clearly this year in our communications that the twin notions of 'Belonging' and 'Connectedness' are high on our agenda so events such as these that bring the community together both to share information and to connect parents are vital.

We are looking forward to welcoming Key Stage 4 parents (both Year 10 and 11) to separate information and study events later this term as we know the benefit that working together has on student progress. As you will see from our recent examinations results, successes at Key Stage 4 outcomes for Fortismere students are going from strength to strength at Fortismere. The degree of progress we make with our students from their starting point is a key indicator of our academic success and this year at Fortismere the early indications from an organisation called FFT (Fischer Family Trust) and the DFE is that our progress 8 score for GCSE in 2023 was our best ever. This is certainly a cause for celebration for those students and the school. We are determined to build on this strength with successive cohorts and we are convinced working in partnership with parents and ongoing discourse around high expectations of attendance, engagement and study is critical in ensuring that students in future cohorts are able to achieve outstanding education outcomes too.

We were pleased to see the whole of Year 12 work on their 'connectedness' this week as our new A level cohort went to Cambridge on Wednesday to spend the day in their tutor groups getting to know one another in a different (excitingly academic!) setting. We understand the students valued the opportunity to explore a new setting together and build those relationships that we know will carry them through the next two years and beyond.

It's also been a week of poetic events as you will see from items in this week's Newsletter. Our Year 8 students were lucky enough to spend time in poetry workshops led by our Poet in Residence, Lewis Buxton while Year 13 students went on a trip to the Barbican to meet Inua Ellans, the poet whose text 'The Half God of Rainfall' they are studying as part of their A level English Literature coursework. We are delighted that so many of our students experience the privilege of engaging with contemporary poets and having the opportunity to explore their craft and the impact of their work.

We are now in October, which is Black History Month (you will have spotted that our communications pantone has changed this week to mark this event.) Staff across the curriculum are organising lesson resources and activities to commemorate Black History month and we look forward to sharing more about this, including students' work over the next few weeks.

We trust that our Fortismere families enjoy the upcoming unseasonably warm weekend.

Science Department News

Science A Level Trip to CERN

Last week, twenty four excited A-Level Science students along with three teachers (Mr. Commons, Mr. Nano and Mrs Morrison) departed London very early and flew to Geneva for a visit to CERN, home of the Large Hadron Collider and a range of experiments involved in better understanding the universe. At CERN the

scientific breakthroughs, such as the discovery of the Higgs boson, require large scale experimental machines. During the visit students gained an appreciation of the technical and engineering challenges that the multinational collaborations at CERN face. Whilst there we were lucky to visit the ALICE experiment where data was being collected as large ions were being collided. As well as CERN, students were

privileged to visit the Plasma Research Centre in Lausanne. Here we had the opportunity to experience live testing of the nuclear fusion test facility and speak to research scientists about their work. Whilst in Geneva the students also visited the United Nations where we saw active documentation of human right atrocities and international discussions on how to govern autonomous cars in the future. Students also visited the Science Museum. This was an amazing trip that certainly inspired everyone who attended. Current Year 12 students should look out for details of the next trip to CERN in March '24. Mr Commons




English Department News

Tiny Twinkles Age 3-6: Perfect for 3-6 year olds led by professional actors with a love for early years!
