Weekly Roundup

It is lovely to end the week bathed in winter sunshine after the heavy rain and strong winds we endured for most of the week. Extremely wet weather is challenging for our students. Our indoor facilities, particularly in the South Wing, are not as accommodating as we would like and students can find it difficult to manage their lunch in a confined space. We do urge students to tidy up after themselves and only use the designated spaces but we are all relieved when we can make better use of our site. We have also had students complain about being cold and wet so we are repeating the message that students need to wear the clothes to school appropriate for the weather and that includes footwear.

Despite the inclement weather, the snow- postponedYear 9 trip to Kew went ahead and as you can see below, the students had a brilliant time. We are proud of the way our students conducted themselves during the trip and also, impressed by the additional knowledge they acquired while there.

Year 13 began their mock examinations on Monday and it is obvious from speaking to them how focused they are and how hard they have prepared for the exams. The rest of the school are being mindful and taking care not to disturb either the exams or Year 13s revising in the Library. Year 11 mocks will begin immediately after Year 13 and we are anticipating the same level of commitment from the year group.

The use of the hall space for examinations has interrupted assembly times and the Co-Heads returned to our Lockdown practice of pre-recording assemblies for the Year 12 assembly yesterday. Much of the narrative around 2022 has been negative and we felt strongly that this should be balanced with a range of 'good news' stories' from last year. From breakthroughs in nuclear fusion to successes in re-wilding and species protection, it wasn't all doom and gloom. We are aware that for many of our young people the world can feel complex and dispiriting and we urged Year 12 to seek out and recognise the good things that happen. The US Supreme Court may have rowed back on women's reproductive rights but Sierra Leone and Malta moved forwards. We introduced the students to <u>Positive News</u> and we hope that they will visit the site and find news stories that inspire and bring joy.

And in a similar joyous vein, we wish all our families a peaceful and at least moderately dry weekend!

Year 9 Trips to Kew Gardens

The Geography Department have really enjoyed taking the Year 9 students to visit Kew Gardens over the past couple of months and we were thrilled to finally be able to take the remaining four classes on Tuesday this week - the snow in December meant we had to reschedule some visits. It was extra special to be able to give this Year 9 cohort the opportunity to visit Kew Gardens, as we know that they have missed out on school trips over the past few years.



We spent the day looking at the ways in which plants have adapted to living in different biomes, such as the desert, tropical rainforest and the temperate biomes. We also looked at how climate change might affect some of these in the future. Students enjoyed walking through the Palm House, the Temperate House and the Princess of Wales Conservatory and completed tasks in each of these locations.

The trip really helps to consolidate the Year 8 learning on the Biomes topic, whilst also linking to the current Year 9 topic of Glaciation and Climate Change, with a particular focus on our changing climate. There was exemplary behaviour by our students during the trips and we were really pleased that they represented the school in such a positive way.
