<p>GCSE and A level contingency planning</p> <p>We wrote to you in December regarding the DfE guidance on the contingency plans that should be in place in the unlikely event that Year11 and Year13 exams are cancelled this year. Whilst the exams are almost definitely taking place the DfE are asking that the schools ensure that they have assessed Yr11 and Yr13 students three times across the academic year and that we keep this evidence in the event that a Teacher-led Assessment (TAG) process replaces public exams.</p> <p>In light of this we will be adding an in-class assessment to our calendar:</p> <p>Year 11 Assessment for Progress Point 3 will be either the last week before the Easter Holidays [w/b 28/3/2022] or the first week back [19/4/2022]. Please ensure that the classes in your subject sit the assessment in the same week.</p> <p>Year 13 Assessment for PP3 will be either the last week before the Easter Holidays [w/b 28/3/2022] or the first week back [19/4/2022] and also 26/27/28 April. Assessments cannot take place on the 28/29/30 March 2022 due to Drama exams.</p> <p>Next week we will be sending out information regarding which topic areas will be assessed. It is important to remember that these assessments will only be used in the highly unlikely event that the exams are cancelled. As such, it is vitally important that students revise all the course content for their summer exams as well as the elements of the course being assessed in these in-class tests.</p> <p>We will support you and prepare you for your assessments, so it is vital that you are in your lessons on time and ready to learn. It is important that students continue to focus on their work and follow the revision guidance given by their subject teachers and access all of the after school and Easter revision support that is being put in place.</p> <p>Covid Update: New guidance</p> <p>New guidance for schools was issued by the DfE on February 21. From February 24 Covid restrictions have been lifted but we will continue to promote good practice for hand and respiratory hygiene. We are aware that some students still wish to wear face coverings in the communal areas and we will allow them to do so.</p>	Co-Headteachers

Therefore, it was great to once again return to a live, in person event last night. Our Femsoc organised a packed programme of speakers, singers and readers with a focus on challenging bias, 'Break the Bias', and reclaiming space. It was an information rich event with inspiring speakers invited to talk about their experiences and achievements covering topics from advertising, health and entrepreneurship. As always, it is our students who inspire us most delivering performances that were both moving and impressive including some of their own musical and poetic creations. Fortismere's students did much to reclaim the space for female voices but we should pay specific thanks to Maya Darmon, Year 13 for her organisation of such an *inspiring* event. What better way to spend a Thursday evening in a South Wing Hall packed to the rafters with Feminists!

We are very sensitive to the fact that anxieties are running higher than normal amongst our student population given current events in Europe. 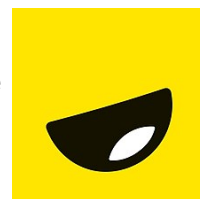

Warning about YUBO app

We recently received the following message from one of our local Police Officers and wanted to share it with our parents and carers:

I just wanted to raise some awareness over a problematic app that has recently had some media attention. The app "YUBO" formally known as "Yellow" is being touted as a dating app for under 18s referred to as "Tinder for Teens". I am sure that prospect alone raises some alarm bells and some of the most worrying features of the app are that it heavily promotes live streaming as the primary chat method, allows chat groups to be set up with no filter on content or topics along with features very akin to apps like "Tinder" such as swiping left/right on profiles for people in your area. There have been reports of sexual offences after meetings arranged through this app and [The Times](#) ran an article about the appalling content young people can be exposed to using it, along with other media outlets such as [The Sun](#) and [New York Post](#). Certainly an app to be aware of, especially if parents/carers are unaware of what it is used for.

We are looking forward to performing these in the coming weeks.

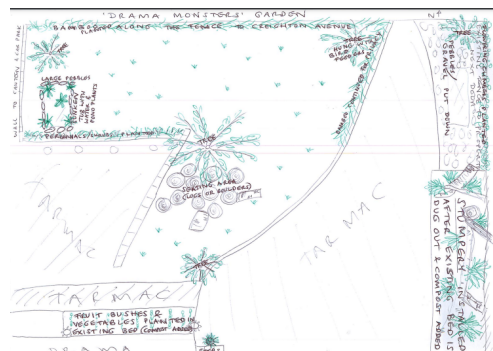


Friday Lunchtime Drama Club

World Book Day was on Thursday 3rd March (although at Fortismere, every day is world book day!) To mark the event, we asked for volunteers from the Senior Management Team and senior teachers to come to all our library lessons and share their reading journeys.

On Monday ...

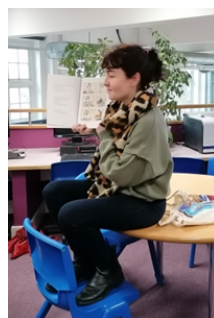
Ms Cuenca challenged Year 7 with her readings in Spanish. Very entertaining, and they managed to learn a few new words too, with one student volunteering to have a go with minimal persuasion. **Ms Davey** delighted with her excerpt from “Howl’s Moving Castle” (Diana Wynne Jones) and it’s testament to her persuasion that the book is now already borrowed with a waiting list. **Mr Fari** inspired students with his tips on how to cope with reading difficulties, and we have made a note of “books are windows into another world”. Our graphic version of “The Handmaid’s Tale” (Margaret Atwood) has been borrowed twice already - proof positive that you can engage students to read something they would not otherwise have even thought about. **Ms St Amour** talked of her love of Philip Pullman and his “Northern Lights” books.



On Tuesday...

Mr Orton shared part of his story and how he came to be a reader, and he excited the students so much about Stephen King that both his recommended books were immediately borrowed. The chapter he read from Arsene Wenger’s autobiography showed the students how much you can learn and enjoy by absorbing yourself in another’s life story and that non-fiction is a perfectly valid book choice. **Ms Brooks** came in with arms bulging with favourite reads from childhood and beyond and shared her early love of reading woven through the well-thumbed paperbacks. **Ms Sullivan** left us all wanting more “Poison For Breakfast” (Lemony Snickett) by reading the first two chapters. She also reminded us to access books in audio format which makes a long dreary

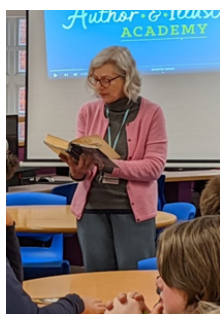
journey/commute so much more palatable. **Mr Aldridge** combined his favourite reads with his favourite subject (philosophy) and encouraged students to look for the meanings in texts – “Alice in Wonderland” was a great example. **Ms Doogan** took us back to our childhood days of being read to, and the students enjoyed the nostalgia of remembering their bedtime stories.



On Wednesday...

Ms Massey stepped into a last minute gap and read from the prologue to “Noughts & Crosses”, leaving the class on a cliffhanger. **Mr Lewis** compared the English and French versions of “The Little Prince” / “Le Petit Prince” and got us all thinking. We enjoyed his reading journey, although some of us might have accepted the \$150 he was offered for an early copy of the last Harry

Potter... **Ms Arrowsmith** discussed the bards of the past and brought Virgil to life in the present. **Mr Orton** was another last minute gap filler and once again delighted and inspired our students. He read from “Fever Pitch” this time which gave us the chance to tell the students that part of the film version was filmed at Fortismere and has one of our ex-teachers in it!



On Thursday...

After the success of her previous visit, **Ms St Amour** returned, reminding us of the beauty of Pullman’s writing with her reading from “The Secret Commonwealth”. She talked about how it enabled her to escape during the start of the pandemic when the book was originally published. **Ms Jackson** read “The Day the Crayons Quit” – our students loved it, and they loved sharing all their World Book Day experiences with her. The first few chapters of Roald Dahl’s “The Twits” were hugely enjoyed too.

Feeling Fit for Study at Fortismere - we need your help

Supporting student well-being and mental health this project funds all aspects of our wellbeing programme, including Place2be and our Sixth Form Counselling Service. Students can access support with a counsellor in a one to one appointment, or at a drop in session at break times for some talking therapy. We are extremely proud of our on-site facilities but it is a challenge to maintain a service like this in the current financial climate. We know how important it is to our students and usage data from last year showed that nearly 100 students across the school were supported by the services.

Place2be has been working in partnership with schools to support children's mental health for 24 years and with Fortismere for over 5 years. They believe that children are less likely to suffer from serious mental health difficulties later in life if they receive support at an early age. This is why we feel so strongly that these services need to be in place and easily accessible to our students. We would like to raise £40,000 to fund the whole project this year. We're also applying for funding from external sources. Unfortunately, these are the projects that get squeezed when funding is tight and there is no additional support from Haringey. Your support will enable us to extend our services and help more students feel fit for study at Fortismere.
