Co-Headteachers' Weekly Roundup

The Year 11 mock examinations began this week and we have been very impressed by the way in which our students have conducted themselves. There have been very few instances of lateness and students have been focused and well prepared. Some students were caught off-guard by the weather and have appeared in hoodies and we just need to remind Year 11 that hoodies are not allowed into the exam hall. Apparently young people are not fans of cardigans, what a shame!

We also started a crowd funding campaign this week to raise funds for the well-being support provided by the Place2be. The initial response from parents/carers and some in the local community has been very generous. Much has been made in the press of the difficulties faced by schools in keeping the level of provision needed while coping with the increased pressure on budgets but we are determined as a school that our students can access the support they need. The crowd funding is open until 2 December and if families are able to give we would be extremely grateful.

One of the key features of Fortismere is the depth of talent in our school community. In addition to our boys' and girls' table tennis teams doing so well we have students whose interests lie in other parts of the curriculum. On Thursday we learned that one of our Year 8 students, Sophie Yenidunya, came second in the Haringey Christmas card competition. Her design is wonderful; she captures the spirit of Haringey while giving her card a Christmas twist. Her drawing is also an entrant in the Fortismere Christmas Card competition, the results of which will be shared next

The winning entrants will be used for the official Fortismere Christmas card and will also be available for purchase at the Fortismere Christmas Fair.

Also on show this week were our very impressive Year 12 dramatists. Ms Overs and Ms Turner worked with the education group in Alexandra Palace to design and perform a piece of physical theatre with Haringey Sixth Form College. The performances took place in the Alexandra Palace Theatre, which is a lovely space. The performances were beautifully executed. The Fortismere students worked in two groups with the Haringey Sixth Form students and it was great to see the strength of the relationships formed in such a short space of time. We look forward to more collaboration with schools and colleges across the borough and also working with Alexandra Palace, who are extending their school projects in a creative and exciting way.

Finally, on Wednesday our Year 13 students were treated to a high powered and relevant study session delivered by David Didau, who is an important voice in the world of education. The students were inspired by his presentation but also, very usefully, they were given a revision tool kit which they were very positive about. David Didau's strategies will be followed up by Year 13 tutors and teachers and it was wonderful to see the students so engaged and enthused by the talk.




Department Messages

Climate Group

For the first time in history we face a problem that affects each and every living thing on earth directly and dramatically. The climate crisis is a problem that we, as humans, have created and therefore have a responsibility to solve.

Shockingly, food is the biggest contributor to carbon emissions in homes. The average person in the UK uses up 25% of their carbon footprint on food, beit waste,



transport or the consumption of high carbon produce. That means that our biggest carbon emitter is the cheapest and easiest to solve.

Eat what you buy. In first world countries, most people throw away about 20% of their food and it all goes to landfills where it generates copious amounts of methane as it degrades. Stopping food waste around the world would have the same effect as taking one in four cars off the road but is a much more attainable goal. By cutting down your grocery list and using up your leftovers, you not only help the environment, but also your bank account, as around £13 billion is wasted on food in the UK per year.

No more cow. Cutting down on meat and dairy can drop a huge amount off you carbon footprint, and, here in England we are lucky to have loads of alternatives on our supermarket shelves that make it easy to replace beef with nut roast and swap cows milk out for oat milk.

Shop locally. Much of our food is imported from countries halfway across the world, chugging out carbon as it flies over to us, so try to shop locally, particularly with fresh, soft fruit and veg as they have to be refrigerated and flown rather than just brought over by ship.

Less packets. Try to buy loose fruit and veg to cut down on plastic packaging and remember to always check that your packets are recyclable as over 150 million tons of plastic packaging is produced per year and, in the UK, only 45% of it is recycled.

Shop seasonally. Buying seasonal fruit and veg is key as, in the off seasons, fossil fuels are used to heat and light greenhouses, producing unnecessarily copious amounts of greenhouse gasses.

Changing your diet is something that everyone can easily do and the positive effect that this could have is truly amazing. So next time you head out to the shops, please keep our planet and home in mind as you pile things into your trolley.




