#### **Enrichment, Pastoral Care and Teaching groups**

The 270 students in the year group are divided into ten mixed ability teaching groups. The students will be in these groups for most of their lessons during the first half term of year 7. The curriculum for all the groups is identical.

During year 7 setting takes place in some subjects; please see the "Setting" section on page 7 for further details. The other subjects are taught in mixed ability groups for the remainder of the year. Further setting takes place in Science from the beginning of year 9.

The school site houses the Blanche Nevile unit for pupils with hearing impairment. Some of these pupils are integrated into some Fortismere lessons across the age range.

In September 2012 the School is introduced a system of Pastoral Care known as "Vertical Tutoring" (VT). In VT tutor groups are not made up of students of the same age, as had been the case at Fortismere for some time. Instead, tutor groups are composed of four or five students from each year group (7 - 11). Each group has a tutor. There will also be sixth form students attached to each group.

The school spent some time in training and preparation for this major change in organisation. The decision to move to VT has been based on the expected benefits for students. These include interactive work for students of different ages which develops leadership skills in the older students, improved opportunities for development of the school – home link through the tutor and a greater focus on pastoral work supporting academic progress, to name just a few.

The students meet in their tutor groups every day; a twenty minute session to be known as *VT time*. During the VT time students will engage in a variety of activities which may be led by the tutor, other College staff or members of the group. There will be a College assembly in one of the school Halls once a week.

Year 7 students will also have a session known as Enrichment, which will take place once every two weeks. In Year 7 enrichment, we will be fostering a sense of community between the students and building their resilience; the students will be developing their presentation, research and team-building skills when fundraising for a charity; and in the third term we will be encouraging students to be more mindful to improve their well-being, concentration and ability to deal with stress.

The timetable follows a two week cycle of 50 lessons.

#### Curriculum

The curriculum is broad, balanced and coherent, with challenge, opportunity and support where necessary. Smaller groups enable better learning, with teaching groups averaging 27 in Year 7. A change in status has seen Fortismere moving forward as a specialist Maths/Computing and Music college, with Modern Foreign Languages as a 2<sup>nd</sup> specialism since September 2007.

The timetable consists of 50 lessons per 10-day timetable cycle. Each lesson lasts for 60 minutes.

The taught programme in Year 7 aims to deliver the National Curriculum (NC) and to provide a broad and balanced education.

#### Setting

Setting will only occur in Maths during Year 7. Setting in Modern Languages takes place in year 8 and in Science from year 9.

#### **Mathematics Setting Policy**

The Mathematics department has implemented a differentiated scheme work in Key Stage 3 for Mathematics; the most effective way of teaching the subject is through ability setting. The students will be set by ability for Mathematics as early as possible in September

The setting for year 7 will initially be based on their baseline test score completed the first week of term combined with the Key stage 2 results. The setting process will be reviewed at half term in the first instance after the completion of three units of works and subsequently at the end of each term.

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#### **Progress at School and Communication with Parents**

There is a continuous cycle of assessment and target setting throughout the year.

Students will be set GCSE targets on the basis of their results in the Key Stage 2 tests taken this term. Our system then breaks these down into year on year targets.

Progress towards these targets and information about effort and behaviour will be shared during the year in a variety of ways. Parents, carers and students are able to access some of this information, including progress towards targets through an on-line tools called "go4schools". Go4schools is also used by teachers to set homework (see Homework section below).

As part of the implementation of Vertical Tutoring (VT), we have introduced a "Learning Conversation". This involves an extended meeting with the child's tutor, who will discuss information regarding progress to targets and other academic issues based on information available on go4schools.

The first meeting is planned for students in year 7 on X October to discuss how well student are settling in and have an early opportunity to identify any issues that may affect progress.

In the Spring Term parents / carers will receive a Full Report in which subject teachers give more detailed feedback. These reports are published on the go4schools website. In the Summer Term there will be a Parents' Evening where teachers will give further feedback in a brief meeting. Dates for these are on page 17.

We have an on-line system which allows parents / carers to book appointment times with their child's teachers; further information will be provided nearer the time of the parents' evening.

#### Homework

The school places great importance on the setting, marking and completion of homework. To support students, homework clubs are organised by individual departments on various evenings after school as well as a regular homework club in the Library. As students progress through the school they may expect the amount of homework to increase substantially. Please see the Homework Policy on the School Website.

Homework tasks are set using the Go4Schools website. Students and Parents / Carers are provided with a username and password to enable them to access the go4Schools website, where they will be able to view the homework activities that have been set. Year 7 students will be shown how to set up their log in during lessons in the first week of the Autumn term.

#### Go4Schools

Go4Scools is a web based resource that the school uses for its real time tracking and recording of student events, assessments and progress. Parents / Carers have access to the site to enable them to view details about their children's progress and attainment. The site is also used to record and inform parents and carers of positive achievements (Core Values) and C3 detentions. If an event is logged on the system, a notification e-mail is sent to parents / carers that evening to ask them to log in to Go4Scools to view the event(s). It is also possible for parents / carers to see their children's homework tasks (see the Homework section above).

#### The Library and Learning Centre

Situated between North and South Wings, the Library is open from 8.00 am till 5.00 pm daily, including break and lunchtimes. A huge range of fiction and non-fiction books is available, as well as DVDs, audio books, magazines and newspapers. There is a photocopier and two colour printers, and a small stationery shop selling essentials at cost price. 32 computers support the increasing emphasis placed on students to develop independent learning skills.

Years 7 and 8 have one library lesson a fortnight and the Accelerated Reader Scheme, with its guizzes, recommendations and rewards, inspires students to read for pleasure.

Reading events take place throughout the year with games, outings, workshops and visiting authors. There are reading clubs to suit all age groups, even parents and teachers, and booklists of recommended reading for each year are constantly updated. Library visits organised by all departments help students to know where books are shelved, how to access the right information and which books to choose. Experienced librarians are always on hand to support the students.

Fortismere Library provides a calm and pleasant space for work and relaxation.

#### **Curriculum Extension and Extra Curricular Activities**

The school is noted for its wide range of extra curricular activities; these are considered a vital part of the development of the whole individual as well as providing opportunities to nurture and develop talent and creativity.

Extensive provision is made in dance, drama and music where students have opportunities to be involved in a spectacular range of shows and concerts, art exhibitions and visits abroad, book week, fashion and food, film and theatre; national engineering awards, mathematics competitions and master classes and science weeks. The school has a long and proud tradition in a wide range of sports, with particular strengths in athletics, cricket, cross-country, soccer (full Saturday programme) and tennis. In recognition of the quality of this provision, the school was awarded the 'Sportsmark' in 2003.

#### Journeys, Visits and Fieldwork

An annual programme includes a variety of educational and outdoor pursuits holidays, both at home and abroad, day and residential field courses in Art, Biology and Geography; exchange visits to France, Germany, Spain and China, numerous day visits to galleries, lectures, museums and theatres etc., usually in connection with the pupils' school work. Residential journeys are organised to Pendarren House, the Borough's Residential Centre in Wales for outdoor pursuits. Several parties visit Pendarren during years 7 and 8.

Parents are asked to complete a form giving formal consent to visit local places of interest such as the library, shops and park or other studies within the locality and also sporting activities which can take place after school or over the weekend. For all other visits and trips separate letters will be sent to you to complete reply slips. The School Governors' policy statement on charges and remission of charges for such activities can be obtained from the school office. The School Association (FSA) provides the Head with a special fund to help towards the costs for pupils whose parents are experiencing financial hardship.

We have introduced "Parentpay"; an online method for making payments for school trips and would encourage all parents / carers to make use of this system. It is easier for staff to manage and means that students do not have to carry cash and remember to hand it in! Please contact the school office for further details.

#### **Special Education Needs**

Fortismere believes that every child is special and that the school has a responsibility to create opportunities to nurture and develop every child in a holistic sense. Where children need additional support for learning or for English as an additional language, it is normally provided through in-class support or through individual/small group work, so that students are helped to achieve their full potential. The site is also the base for the Secondary Department of Blanche Nevile School for the deaf and hearing impaired; a number of who are integrated for some of the curriculum.

This provision, known as LINC, is based in the Tetherdown building.

#### Philosophy, Religion and Ethics at Fortismere School

Philosophy, Religion and Ethics (PRE) is taught to all students in Years 7-10. We attempt to answer challenging questions about the ultimate meaning and purpose of life, beliefs about God, the self, the nature of reality, issues of right and wrong and what it means to be human.

In the autumn term, students focus on Philosophy. We study Plato, Aristotle, Descartes, Hume and Kant, and evaluate their answers to a variety of philosophical problems. We also learn to philosophise ourselves through discussion, debate, and essay writing. Students are encouraged to think about some of the biggest questions, and are given the tools to go about answering them.

In the spring term we focus on Religion. We study the history, beliefs and practices of the six major world faiths – Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism and Sikhism – as well as looking at new religions and Humanism. We consider how religious teachings are applied and how beliefs influence people's behaviour. Students are encouraged to learn about and from different religions, while exploring their own beliefs and questions of meaning.

In the summer term we focus on Ethics. We study ethical theories and different interpretations of 'right' and 'wrong'. We evaluate these ideas by applying them to important and relevant situations, and through this we learn to make decisions about our own behaviour. We focus on how we treat others, and how we treat ourselves, by looking at sex and relationships, physical and mental health, and drugs and alcohol.

Students will have to show progress in terms of their knowledge and understanding of these topics, and their ability to analyse and evaluate different ideas. They will be assessed on their essay writing, speaking and debating, and independent research skills. While Philosophy, Religion and Ethics are taught in separate modules, there is significant crossover between each area, providing a rounded education and a wide skill-set. We aim to provide students with a broad range of knowledge, the desire to be inquisitive for more, and the skills with which to gain it.

#### **Student Voice**

There is a student leadership system that "mirrors" the Senior Leadership of the school. The senior students in the sixth form will lead students in younger year groups in organising meetings and providing a voice for the student body on the Leadership Team of the staff and in the Governing Body.

Pupils and staff together support local and national charities and pupils make a valued contribution in the local community including helping the elderly or disabled.

#### **Appearance**

There is no school uniform - a decision made jointly by parents, students and staff when the School opened. Part of the Fortismere philosophy is that students should develop their individuality – that includes taking responsibility for their appearance. They are expected to wear clothing which is clean, tidy and inoffensive; they should be suitably dressed for work in school and for the changes in weather which may occur during the school day. We do have a "dress code"; guidelines for students to ensure that their clothing is appropriate. This forms part of our Behaviour for Learning Policy, which is available on the school website.

#### **Behaviour**

Pupils are expected to work in a friendly but disciplined atmosphere for learning. Arrangements governing behaviour in school are displayed prominently in school diaries and around the school. Such guidelines are kept to a common-sense minimum but are effectively enforced. Great stress is laid upon the importance of self-discipline, consideration for others and care of the school environment. The school has a very low tolerance for pupils whose attitudes and behaviour interfere with their work, and that of others; they can expect their parents to be informed and requests made for the behaviour to be modified. This is most commonly undertaken by the Tutor or Head of College, but other Senior Staff are involved in more serious cases. There is a clear structure, with a tariff system, for the management of students whose behaviour is unacceptable and those who persist in causing low level disruption. Threatening or violent behaviour, disrespectful treatment of staff and involvement in substance abuse always results in very serious consequences. Opportunities for counselling are provided. In order to facilitate good behaviour and good learning, you will be asked to sign a Home/School Agreement.

#### **Behaviour For Learning (BfL)**

BfL is our behaviour management system with a small number of clear rules and a school wide system of implementation of 'consequences' (referred to as Cs) for students when their behaviour impacts on their learning or the learning of others (in the classroom) or when their behaviour around the school in unacceptable.

There is a whole school system including a school detention (C3) after school every day. The detentions are for 45 minutes and students will only be excused from detention for prearranged medical appointments. Parents / carers are notified of C3 detentions by a notification from our "Go4Schools" system; please see the Go4Schools section on page 9.

We expect that any after school activities / appointments arranged by parents / carers will take this into account. We would ask all parent / carers to read and discuss the school's behaviour policy, available on the school's website, with their children.

Please note that the school is currently reviewing it policy regarding mobile phones and similar electronic devices. A separate communication will be sent to all parents / carers before the start of the new academic year.

There are also changes in our system regarding isolation (C4). These changes will be explained in an updated version of the Behaviour policy, which will be posted on the school's web site before the beginning of next term.

\*important update 15sep17\*

From the beginning of this term, the BfL system has been adjusted to introduce three type of detention. The rationale behind this move is to recognise that different types of failure to follow the behaviour system should result in different types of sanction.

The different types of sanction are now;

C20 – a 20 minute detention form organisational failures such as lateness, not wearing a lanyard and not bringing a reading book to school. In C20 detentions students will be expected to read their book.C20 detentions take place on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

C40 – a 40 minute detention for poor behaviour in the classroom (C1, C2, C3) or around school. In C40 detentions, students will be allowed to complete curriculum work they bring along, or read their reading book. C40 detentions take place on Mondays and Wednesdays.

C60 – a 60 minute detention on Fridays, supervised by members of the senior team. C60 detentions will be issued for more serious breaches of the BfL rules, accumulating a number of C20/40 detentions in a short period of time and failing to attend a C20 or C40 detention.

CISO (Isolation) remains in place for more serious or persistent breaches of the BfL rule.



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#### **Student Attendance**

The attendance of pupils is checked by class teachers / tutors each lesson using electronic registration.

If your daughter / son is absent from school for any reason, please contact the school on each day of absence by email: <a href="mailto:attendance@fortismere.org.uk">attendance@fortismere.org.uk</a> (please copy in your child's tutor) or by phone on 020 8365 4429.

If a student has to leave the premises during the day, a note will be required in advance for signature by the tutor and for reception to see before signing out. Students in years 7-9 should be collected by a parent or other nominated adult; the reception staff will not usually give permission for a Key Stage 3 student to leave alone.

The school has a text message system which automatically sends a message to parents if a child is marked absent in the morning.

If a child is taken ill during the school day, they will be cared for in the medical room and if necessary a member of the team will contact a parent / carer to arrange for the child to be collected from school.

We are very aware of the close link between attendance and achievement and set high targets for attendance. Please note that parents / carers should apply in advance for permission for their children to be absent from school for reasons other than illness / medical appointments (Leave of Absence). Such permission is at the discretion of the Headteacher and only granted in exceptional circumstances. Please see the Attendance Policy on the school website for further details.

#### **Buildings and Playing Fields**

There are playgrounds and social areas in both Wings of the school with wooden seats outside which the students may use in good weather. Students may come into the buildings before morning school or during break and wait in particular areas. There are designated indoor and outdoor areas for students who bring a packed lunch and at lunchtimes access is also available for use of the library, club activities and toilet facilities. The playing fields may be used at break or lunchtimes during dry weather, though this is normally only possible during the summer term. Students are expected to use break times to move between Wings and be ready to be taught before the start of the next lesson.

#### **School Lunches**

The school runs a cashless catering system. Parents add funds to students' accounts online. These funds are debited using a biometric finger scanning system in the canteen (or a PIN number system, if preferred). There is a limit to the amount any student can spend on any one day and it is possible to monitor what is being consumed. Information and instructions can be found on the school's website. Please contact the school office for further details or for help with the online funding.

If your child qualifies for free school meals, you should apply through the local authority, who will then liaise with the school.

#### **Equipment**

Pupils are expected to bring pens, pencils, ruler and rubber to class; felt tip pens or pencils for colouring will be useful as is a calculator for Maths And Science lessons. Mathematical instruments will be needed from time to time; usually these items are provided by parents but the school will make provision upon request. Please also see the "Presentation Pledges" at the end of this document.

#### **Money and Personal Possessions**

The school has cashless systems and will not be held responsible for pupils' money and they are discouraged from bringing large sums of money into school. Mobile phones and other electronic equipment should not be brought to school and the school accepts no liability for such items. We do not encourage students to cycle to school and they should not bring scooters, skateboards or similar items. The school is not insured against the loss or theft of personal belongings and does not accept responsibility or liability for them.

#### **Lost Property and Lockers**

The school cannot accept responsibility for articles lost on the premises but if possessions are clearly marked return of lost property, when found, is possible. If property is lost please contact the Welfare Officer. The Fortismere School Association has provided a number of lockers for each year group.

#### **Weekly Newsletter**

The Headteacher sends a letter to each parent/carer and pupil every week containing information about forthcoming events and other matters relevant to the school community. This is sent using the Parentmail system and is also available on the school website; <a href="https://www.fortismere.haringey.sch.uk">www.fortismere.haringey.sch.uk</a>.

If you have not signed up for Parentmail, please contact the school office as this is our major method of communicating news and information.

#### Fortismere School Association (FSA)

The Fortismere School Association was founded in 1983. All parents, students and staff are members without subscription. Parents of new Year 7 pupils are particularly encouraged to become involved with the group who work hard and harmoniously together for the benefit of the students at the same time as having a lot of fun! The Association holds educational and social events, raises substantial sums of money, and provides refreshments at parents' evenings or school functions.

#### **Governing Body**

The Governors of Fortismere are a highly committed group of seven elected parents, three elected members of staff, four nominees of the Council, five community Governors, co-opted by the Governing Body, and the Headteacher, as well as two student associate Governors. They take a very keen interest in all aspects of school life, including: new initiatives, curriculum evolution, pupil welfare, finance and premises, staffing and personnel, and are a key force in the continued success of the school. In the interests of safety, parents are asked not to drive on to the school premises before, during and immediately after school, including lunchtimes. If you drop your children off at school, please do not park on the mandatory yellow lines at school entrances at all times.
