The Role of the Form Tutor

- To be the first point of contact for student wellbeing.
- To deliver the pastoral curriculum.
- To monitor students for positive behaviours for learning, including attendance and punctuality.
- To meet students 1:1 to support their progress.
- To support students in exploring a range of options and pathways for next steps.
- To encourage students to get involved in super curricular and extra curricular activities.



The Pastoral Week



ASSEMBLY (WK 2) / PSHRSE (WK 1)

A planned programme of assemblies alternates every other week with age appropriate lessons on mental and physical health, sex and relationships, and citizenship.



STUDY SKILLS

Information and activities to support you in developing successful learning habits and routines.



FUTURES

Information and activities to help students to research and prepare for post-18 education and training, including direct, practical work on completing applications in the final term of Year 12.



1:1 MENTORING

Tutors use Thursday's form time to meet with students one-to-one, allowing you the opportunity to reflect on your progress and recieve personalised guidance.



Life Lessons (Monday Wk 1)

Students learn an age and stage appropriate Personal, Social, Health, Relationships, and Sex curriculum in three strands. The strands are taught on rotation by tutors who are experts in their specific area.

Study Skills (Tuesday)

The theme of this half term has been 'building independence', with study skills sessions focused on supporting students with the step up to Sixth Form study, including:

- Wellbeing and Balance




Futures (Wednesday)



- · Be tolerant of others



Be Ready

Come prepared and on time for lessons, independent study, and tutoring. Independently manage time effectively and engage fully with learning.

Be Respectful

Consistently treat teachers, support staff, and peers with consideration.
Seek out opportunities to support younger students where possible.

Be Safe

Take responsibility for their own safety and that of others. Always wear their Sixth Form lanyard and act responsibly around the site, online, and in the local community. Speak up if they see something that is not right.


Be Kind

Sixth Form Expectations

Most of the conversations we have with students about expectations in school relate to the three areas below!



Lanyards


Students are expected to wear an unbroken line of clothing from shoulder to mid-thigh, sensible footwear, and no offensive slogans or symbols.

Dress Code Phones

It is very important that our increasingly adult looking Sixth Formers are wearing their lanyards **every day, all the time** to show they are members of our school community.

Students are allowed to use their phones inside Tetherdown or under the direction of a teacher. Their phones should <u>not</u> be in sight around lower school students/in lower school areas.





The aim is **95% attendance**, including <u>all</u> absences -- even when there is a good reason!

The research is clear:

Every 5% lost after 95% =
a full grade lower in their
final exams.

Last year, students with 95%+ attendance achieved on average a grade <u>above</u> target in their A Level exams.

- We expect students to show respect and kindness to your peers, younger students, teachers, support staff and Sixth Form spaces.
- We expect students to put their best effort in and seek feedback on how to improve.



Teaching and Learning

Students study a wide range of subjects, supported by subject specialist teachers in specialist teaching areas.

Teachers use a wide range of activities and teaching styles as best fits the subject and class.

Regular assessment (informal and formal) is used by teachers and the wider Sixth Form team to identify areas of strength and development, as well as students who need further support across multiple subjects.

Although it seems impossible to believe, it is already only **5 terms** until students will be sitting their end of Year 13 exams!





Teaching and Learning

Independent Learning

Students are expected to spend **1** hour working independently for every **1** hour of class time they have in a given subject across a week. Doing this consistently will lead them to meet and exceed their target grades by the end of Year 13.

This works out to roughly 15 hours of work outside of lessons per week.

After the Lesson – 60 mins

REVIEW YOUR NOTES



- Highlight key terms covered in class.
- Write these in the GLOSSARY books as provided with your teachers.

CHECK YOUR UNDERSTANDING



 Use the questions at the end of every chapter to test your understanding.

CHECK YOUR TEXTBOOK



 Use your textbook and the resources on Google Class at what you don't get to see if that clarifies it.

WRITE A SUMMARY



Get into the habit of summarising the main elements covered in the lesson that day, include specialist language evidence and examples

POST IT NOTE REMINDERS



 Make a note of the parts you are not sure on to remind you to ask your teacher in the next lesson.

At the end of a Topic/Chapter – 90 mins

REVIEW YOUR NOTES



 Compare to the spec to see if you have any gaps in your notes.

FILL IN ANY GAPS YOU HAVE.



- Ask your teachers for any sheets that you have failed to complete.
- Review the information using the text book.

WRITE A SUMMARY



- Complete a mindmap of the information
- Use your CLASSNOTES to fill in the information.

CHECK YOUR UNDERSTANDING



- Complete a blank paper test.
- Complete the end of chapter tests

ASK FOR HELP



See your teacher for help with anything you are not sure on or don't understand.

LIST KEY IDEAS AND SCHOLARS



 Write a profile of any scientists that may have been covered in the lesson.

At the End of the Unit – 120 mins +

REVIEW YOUR NOTES



 Compare the questions in the tests to the spec. to see if you have any gaps in your notes.
